

# FRIDAY MEMO

September 2, 2005

1. By now everyone has most likely heard about the Board of County Commissioner approval of the Clearwater Project and its direction to the staff at Water Environment Services (WES) to implement it. Nonetheless, I repeat it here. The Board voted 2-1 to adopt the Clearwater Plan, and they voted 3-0 to adopt the necessary rates and to direct the staff to implement the plan. WES staff (Jay Bacon and Ted Kyle) did a very nice job of summarizing. They noted that the public outreach effort that was launched after the August 11, 2005 Board hearing resulted on 68% of the respondents indicating approval. They noted that they were guided by the following principles in making their recommendation:
  - Wastewater should not constrain residential or business development because of a lack of capacity;
  - Wastewater should support and not constrain the development of new jobs and economic growth;
  - Neighborhoods affected by the resulting plan should be left better off than they were before; and
  - Open space is an important consideration in the development of a new plan.

The staff responded to the argument that Kellogg is still functional, and, therefore, it should not be replaced by analogizing it to the Baker Bridge, which connects the south side of the Clackamas River to Carver. The bridge is to be replaced in 2007, even though it still carries traffic. The bridge, like Kellogg, “does the job it was designed to do, but both are obsolete.” In acting to approve the project, the Board noted that it would continue to insist on a vigorous public process at each stage of the implementation in order to fully inform and to seek guidance.

2. During the past week I have received a number of calls asking for information regarding donations to the victims of Hurricane Katrina. 3. I have also received numerous inquiries about our preparedness should we face an emergency situation. We are constantly working to upgrade our ability to respond to an emergency. Recently, we moved the Emergency Operations Center from the interior of the Police department to the Community Meeting Room at PSB. We found that the room that was originally designated for emergency response personnel was just too small. Moving to the Community Meeting Room will better enable us to work as a team as well as to pay attention to each functional area. The

move does not affect the use or availability of the room for meetings. A number of new phone jacks have been added to accommodate the need for communications during an emergency. We will restrict access to the room during an emergency. Appropriate staff has recently completed the online introductory course in the National Incident Management System provided by the Federal Emergency Management Agency, and a number of people will be attending the week long in-depth course as soon as it is scheduled in the metro area. The goal will be to have a sufficient number of people ready to assume leadership responsibilities should an event occur. Finally, we will continue to conduct simulations. Clackamas Fire District No. 1 has developed simulations in the past, and they will continue to do so in the future.

4. On September 13, 2005, the Planning Commission will consider an application of Craig and Donna Lomnicki to partition their property resulting in one additional building lot. The property is located at the corner of Brookside Drive and Johnson Creek Boulevard. The Commission will also consider a request of St. John's Episcopal Church on 21st Avenue in downtown Milwaukie to add additional signs to the building.
  
5. On July 19, 2005, the City Council approved resolution number 37-2005 authorizing participation in limited tax pension bonds to pay the City's unfunded actuarial liability in the Oregon Public Employees Retirement System. The action was taken in order to join with other local governments in taking advantage of current low market interest rates. The City Council also passed a motion directing the City Manager to provide updated information regarding the bond issue before finalizing participation. The table below presents the list of local governments that have taken action to participate in the pension bond series. Final opt-in letters must be submitted by each jurisdiction on or before September 6, 2005 in order to confirm participation.

The City of Milwaukie received updated calculations from PERS specifying the City's UAL on September 30, 2005 to be \$4,172,723. The supplemental payment from the pension bond proceeds would reduce the City's PERS rate 4.37% from 14.17% to 9.80%. Seattle-Northwest Securities Corporation is the broker for the pension bond series. They indicated on August 31, 2005 that current bond issues are being priced at below 5.5%. They estimate that participation in the pension bond series could generate annual savings to the City of Milwaukie of approximately \$71,274 and present value total savings of \$1,012,383.

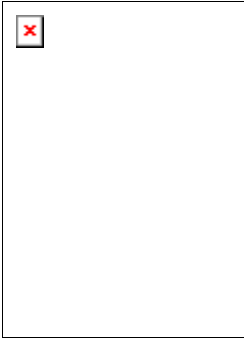
6. We will begin forwarding liquor license applications to the NDAs for their review. There are a couple of caveats, however. Given a number of statutory and regulatory requirements, we cannot ensure that they will have sufficient time to submit comments--should they desire to do so--to the Council in each case. The regulatory framework requires that we submit responses within a given period of time, so the ability to do so will be dependent upon an NDA's schedule. In addition, a recommendation to deny a license can only be based upon specific statutory and regulatory reasons. We will see that they receive a list of the permissible reasons. (Remember that our response to the OLCC is a recommendation only.) Oddly enough, the OLCC is required to notify an established NDA of a new license application, but the statute does not require that it do so on a renewal.
  
7. The Milwaukie and West Linn Police Departments have joined forces to

offer the first "citizens academy" sponsored by a local department in Clackamas County. The 13-week academy starts on September 7, 2005 and runs through December 7, 2005. The academy will examine the role of police in society and offer opportunities for citizens to participate in some of the law enforcement skill training specialties that new recruit officers have to pass to become certified police officers. The goal of the Citizens Police Academy is to develop citizen awareness of the role of police in the community and an understanding of what police and citizens, working together, can do to reduce crime and enhance the safety in the community. Some of the skills training will include firearms qualification, defensive tactics, violator contact, dispatch operations, jail operations, hostage negotiations and crisis intervention, ethics, and domestic violence. Instructors for these topics are the same instructors who teach at the State-sponsored police academy. The academy is offered to 10 Milwaukie and 10 West Linn residents. Instructors for the 13-week curriculum are being provided by the Clackamas County Sheriff's Office, Clackamas County District Attorney's Office, and the State of Oregon Department of Public Safety Standards and Training. Coordination for This first-time community based program is being coordinated by Sergeant David Rash, Milwaukie Police Department; Dolly Macken-Hambright, Milwaukie's Public Safety Advisory Committee, and Sergeant Rick Senger, West Linn Police Department.

**DISTRICT ADVISORY BOARD MEETING SEPT. 8** - The District Advisory Board will meet Thursday, Sept. 8, at 6 p.m. at (CHANGE OF LOCATION) North Clackamas County Chamber of Commerce auditorium, just off Harmony Road next to North Clackamas Aquatic Park. **ON THE WAY** - The land use applications for North Clackamas Community Park including the Community Service Overlay, Water Quality Resource Review and a Transportation Plan Review were approved by the City of Milwaukie Planning Commission July 12. A subsequent appeal with a modified concept plan was approved by the City Council on Aug. 16. W&H Pacific is currently developing construction documents for the approved plan. Construction is anticipated to begin in spring/summer of 2006.

**TROLLEY TRAIL PROGRESS** - Oregon Department of Transportation issued a "Notice to Proceed" for the Trolley Trail project. Preliminary engineering and design of the trail is scheduled to begin in the fall and will be managed by Clackamas County's engineering division of the Department of Transportation and Development. The six-mile span is the old Portland Traction Co. line, stretching from Gladstone to Milwaukie.

**WEB SITE UNDER CONSTRUCTION** - The North Clackamas Parks and Recreation District's Web site - long in need of a facelift - is under construction. **VOLUNTEER UPDATE** - Three important new volunteer positions were filled in August. The first is an experiment with involving volunteers as greeters at the Aquatic Park. This has proven to be a great addition to the retail space, with volunteers answering questions from A to Z. The second position is a new general office volunteer at the main District office in the Sunnybrook Service Center in Clackamas. This volunteer is involved with data entry, packet assembly and other essential support tasks. And finally, NCPRD recently "hired" a volunteer to take digital photos at events and happenings. She will work primarily at Milwaukie Center

**SPRUCING UP THE PLACE(S)** - Two NCPRD facilities have scheduled their annual closures to do some deep cleaning and to address some maintenance issues during the month of September. The **Milwaukie Center** - 5440 SE Kellogg Creek Dr. inside North Clackamas Park - closes after Labor Day, the week of Sept. 5-9 for its annual maintenance week. **North Clackamas Aquatic Park** will be closed Sept. 6-23 for the cleaning of that facility. Located just west of SE 82nd Avenue and Sunnyside Road, the Aquatic Park closes after the 2005 Dog Daze event, which is the finale before the cleaning. It reopens Saturday morning, Sept. 24.

**BOW WOW WOW!** - Dog Daze 2005 gives NCPRD the opportunity to open its doors for a swim day for dogs in three sessions Tuesday, Sept. 6, from noon to 8 p.m. at North Clackamas Aquatic Park.

The event takes place the day before the Aquatic Park closes down for three weeks of annual maintenance. All pools will be drained immediately after the dogs swim. Pools will be cleaned, serviced and sanitized before they are filled with fresh water and re-chlorinated. The Clackamas County Health Department determined that there would be no significant health risks posed by allowing the dogs to swim in the facility.

The first session is from noon to 2 p.m. for the fresh water dogs-only swim. Fees are \$7 per dog and \$10 for a multiple-dog family. Fees include one person per dog admission and a \$2 or one can or one bag of dog food per additional person. Six dollars is the maximum family rate for additional people admission on all three sessions.

Session 2, the semi-fresh water dogs-only swim, is from 3 to 5 p.m., with \$6 per dog and \$10 for a multi-dog family. The third session, from 6 to 8 p.m., not-so-fresh water session, is \$5 per dog and \$10 for a multiple-dog family. Sessions two and three also include the one person per dog admission with a \$2 fee or one can or bag of dog food per additional person.
