

## MIKE'S FRIDAY MEMO

MAY 11, 2007

1. This Saturday, May 12<sup>th</sup>, is the Friends of the Ledding Library Plant Sale. It will be held at the Library Pond House, 2215 SE Harrison from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. There are literally hundreds of plants for sale along with stepping-stones and other garden art. There is also a jumble sale in the garage, so there should be something for everyone.
2. Be on hand for opening day of the Milwaukie Sunday Farmers' Market on May 13 from 9:30 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. Enjoy the family-friendly atmosphere; great local produce, meats, cheeses, and baked goods; crafts; plants; live music; and food booths. 3. City engineering staff will be at the Hector Campbell Neighborhood Association meeting on Monday, May 14 to give an update on the planned improvements for the 42<sup>nd</sup> Avenue/King Road intersection. The meeting will be at 7 p.m. at the Public Safety Building, 3200 SE Harrison Street.
4. The next TSP Advisory Committee will be held on May 16, 2007, from 4:30 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. at the Milwaukie Masonic Lodge (10636 SE Main Street, Milwaukie). The agenda for this meeting will focus on preparing the committee members for the next phase of the project, Alternatives Analysis. Material to be discussed includes forecasts for future traffic conditions and a proposed project evaluation approach. 5. The Milwaukie Ledding Library reports its busiest April in history. Not only did circulation set a new record, but interlibrary loan statistics were up too. Thanks to all Library employees and volunteers for your hard work. See attachment 1 for the statistics and attachment 2 for the April Newsletter.
6. Earlier this week our CodeRED emergency notification system was put to the test and worked like a champ. Here's a comment from our emergency dispatch provider: "Just wanted to let you know about another successful activation of the City's CodeRED system. On the Riverway Lane call we were asked by the Sergeant to call reserves. We activated CodeRED at 1353 hrs and we had our first reserve call back by 1356 hrs. By 1410 hrs we had received calls from 6 of our reserves .... We were then asked to call in Cadets. Again the system worked like a charm. The activation was at 1429 hrs; by 1432 hrs we had our first call back. .... All in all it went well and saved us in LOCOM an amazing amount of time." 7. At the beginning of the week, Milwaukie Police and the Metro Gang Task Force arrested several people responsible for the rash of gang graffiti that took place in our community – including a number of schools -- from January through March. Police Chief Larry Kanzler reports, “These gang members are responsible for about a dozen "gang" tag vandalisms throughout Milwaukie and Clackamas County. The arrest of these gang members has resulted in the dissolution of the KCB gang and its leaders. This investigation and subsequent arrest of these gang folks is the direct result of our affiliation and partnership with the Metro Gang Task Force where Detective Cereghino works and represents the interests of the Milwaukie Police Department. We also received \$18,000 in grant funding from Project Safe Streets in 2007 with a 2008 projection of \$22,000 all for gang intervention, education, and youth gang outreach. We would not be authorized access to these grant funds had it not been for our affiliation with the Metro Gang Task Force and support of the FBI and US Attorney's Office.”
8. This week Mayor Jim Bernard, Councilor Carlotta Collette, and Grady Wheeler attended the Oregon Downtown Development Association (ODDA) conference in Astoria. The Mayor accepted, on behalf of the North Main Village project, the ODDA's award for Community Partnership.
9. Community Services staff are working with downtown residents Dion Shepard and Val Hubbard, to implement a "flower bed adoption" program for Main Street and 21st Avenue. As part of this effort, volunteers will be identified to plant and maintain the "bulbouts" or flower beds in the downtown area. City staff is working on contracting for watering of the beds and has arranged for flower baskets to be hung on downtown light posts again this year.
10. The Council is seeking applicants for several appointed advisory board positions. The Design and Landmarks Committee has two vacancies. ## Clackamas County Funding For Libraries In Transition

As many newsletter readers already know, the Ledding Library receives most of its funding from two sources – the City of Milwaukie’s general fund and Clackamas County’s general fund. During the current fiscal year, the city is contributing \$1,255,043 to the library’s budget and the County is kicking in \$495,258. It is the County’s contribution that may change in the future. For almost 100 years, counties across the United States received a share of the money generated by logging that took place on federal lands – since the counties could not levy taxes on federal property, it seemed only fair that they should be able to be compensated in some way for the federal lands within their jurisdictions. Since Oregon has a large amount of federal land, the state has benefited from significant revenues under this program. The payments, however, started dwindling in the 1990’s as timber harvests declined. To make up for the loss of revenue, Oregon’s Senator Ron Wyden helped create the *Secure Roads and Community Self Determination Act* in 2000 – this legislation provided to funding to counties to take the place of the timber money. Unfortunately, this law expired in 2006 and was not renewed. There was a general feeling in Congress that only a few states, including Oregon, received an inordinate share of the money. After difficult negotiations, Senator Wyden announced a compromise that would continue reduced funding for at most five more years. This measure is currently before Congress as part of a stalled federal budget. It seems clear, then, that Clackamas County will be receiving less federal money in the coming years. To deal with this decreased revenue, the County will have to cut its budget in a number of areas. It is beginning to look as if the Ledding Library, as one of the public libraries in Clackamas County, will see its funding diminish.

- The Friends of the Ledding Library 2007 Book Sale will take place on June 22, 23 and 24 at the Milwaukie Waldorf School across the street from the library. Bring all your unwanted DVDs books, videos, sheet music and CDs to the Library and we’ll put them in our sale -- all proceeds go to the Friends who, in turn, support many library programs and projects.
- Over 1,300 pounds of food were collected at the Ledding Library during “Food For Fines Week.” During the week of April 15-21, library patrons had the option of having each 50¢ waived from their fine record for each item of food donated. The food that was collected was given to the Oregon Food Bank for distribution in the Milwaukie area.
