

MIKE'S FRIDAY MEMO

September 28, 2007

1. Liz Field, Interim Executive Director of the Johnson Creek Watershed Council, writes,

“Great news - thanks to the hard work of Greg Ciannella and input from JoAnn Herrigel, Michelle Bussard and others, the Council has been awarded a \$49,575 grant from OWEB - which was the amount requested. The grant will support: technical assistance funding for instream and floodplain enhancement designs (TA1) for Klein Point, at the confluence of Johnson Creek and the Willamette River. The project will consist of a professional river restoration firm working with the council and various partners to develop pre-implementation designs for improving instream fish habitat, channel complexity, and floodplain connectivity. OWEB funds will be used primarily for contracted services and project management. Work will begin in the coming months on this multi-year project.”

2. This Sunday, September 30 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. neighbors are holding a rummage sale in the Cash Spot, 11100 SE McLoughlin Boulevard, parking lot to benefit Spring Park.
3. Join the Ardenwald Neighborhood and assorted local officials at the National Walk Your Child to School event on Wednesday, October 3. The group will converge at 7:30 a.m. at Lisac's, 9035 SE 32nd Avenue.
4. There are only 5 Sunday Farmers' Markets left this year, and there is still a lot of wonderful local produce available along with great food vendors and live music. The Market is every Sunday from now through October in the parking lot across from City Hall. The hours are 9:30 a.m. to 2 p.m., and there's plenty of free parking. Remember to stop by the Friends of the Ledding Library Booktique and the Community Information Booth.

The Milwaukie's Farmers Market will close its season on October 28 with the *Second Annual Pumpkin Carving Contest*. This year there will be three categories to enter: The Mayor Look-A-Like, The Scariest (youth and adult divisions) and The Best Overall. Winners of each category will receive gift certificates to Bob's Red Mill. Mayor Bernard, who is also the Farmers' Market Business Manager, says there were about a dozen entries last year, but he's hoping to double that number this year. Those wishing to participate are asked to bring their carved pumpkins to the Market by 10 a.m.

5. State Representatives Carolyn Tomei and Diane Rosenbaum and Senator Kate Brown will hold a Town Hall on Wednesday, October 3 from 6:30 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. at Milwaukie City Hall in the Council Chambers. They will answer questions from the public and preview some of the issues to be discussed during the February session.

6. Last May Council approved a request from Dick and Sally Shook to name the creeklette running through North Clackamas “Camas Creek” and staff recently received this update from Dick on the progress of that name change:

“Hello Friends of Camas Creek:

I followed up with the Secretary of the Oregon Geographic Names Board for a status on our request for official recognition of the Camas Creek name for our creeklette in N. Clackamas Park. She told me that they had received the application and that it will be discussed at a subcommittee meeting in October. It will then be discussed at the full Geographic Names Board in December. If approved, and I got the impression that it probably will be, it will be sent to the Federal Geographic Names Board for their review. She said that the Feds usually follow the recommendation of the State Boards. I did not get a time as to when the Federal Board meets, but it will be sometime in 2008.

In the meantime, we appreciate the continued use of the name Camas Creek by everyone, as it will help to imprint this name into public usage.”

7. Planning staff reports the Transportation System Plan (TSP) draft chapters are now available on the City’s website in varying states of completion. Council will review the full draft TSP at its work session on October 16, and the Planning Commission will hold a hearing on October 23. Friday Memo September 21, 2007

Last Council meeting I apologized for my negativity at the prior Council meeting I have always tried to be a positive force. I took Kenny Asher's comments to heart because I respect his point of view and vision. I am just somebody that loves Milwaukie. It gets very frustrating sometimes when we neglect to see the many positive things that are happening in Milwaukie and the growing influence Milwaukie has achieved with our partners in the region and beyond.

Metro purchased the Texaco gas station from the Olson family because the Olson family was proud of the direction Milwaukie was heading after all those years of in action. They purchased the site because the City asked and Council voted unanimously to work with Metro in partnership to develop the site. There was an offer to buy the site and put in a gas station/mini-mart but the Olson family wanted better for Milwaukie. Thank you Brad Olson for thinking about your community first and waiting to get through the many hurdles.

There were of course many things going on in the City that may not have been so visible to the average citizen such as:

- The gradual purchase of riverfront property and the fact that the Klein family donated a key portion of the riverfront at the mouth of Johnson Creek.
- Milwaukie had worked for years to fix McLoughlin and by the time I was elected the staff and Council had worked hard to get us the money.
- The fact that we got from the federal government \$4 million dollars for Lake Road and construction will start in 2008.
- Council finally created a road maintenance program and funding package with little opposition. They had been working on it since 1988.
- The farmers market has been successful now in our 9th year and the City has been behind us the entire time providing the space free of charge, providing water, paying for electrical updates, and last year we received a \$3000 grant through the City provided by Clackamas County tourism.
- We have 600 new jobs in Milwaukie and probably \$30 to \$50 million in new investment. In 2001 we only had about 30% occupancy in our North Industrial area.
- People are living on Main Street that has been shown to create downtown revitalization and stimulate investment. We have 3 new restaurants being built in downtown. Studies show that for every \$1 invested in downtown returns \$30 to the citizens. It takes time.
- Phase II of light rail has been funded \$250 million dollars because our legislature trusts that Milwaukie has achieved a new vision that supports sustainability for future generations.

We live in a society of instant gratification but this stuff takes years. That is the hardest thing for someone like me, a small business owner, dealing with the bureaucracy of

government. I work hard as does our staff to become customer friendly and to promote sustainable development.

Andy Parker said in his article that I “was my own worst enemy” how insightful. I have been working out, losing weight, and training for the marathon since November 2006 and I keep injuring myself because I feel so good. I have crashed my bike and bruised my ribs, and last week because I think I am superman I tried to lift something and hurt my back. I feel so good about Milwaukie and **all** we are doing, so again I apologize and promise to work harder to be more positive and not hurt myself or the community.

I could go on for pages and pages about all the wonderful changes and potential for Milwaukie but work calls me to action. Have a great weekend

Ledding Library Wins Grant For Poetry Series

Library Board member Tom Hogan recently announced that Ledding has been granted a \$2,800 award to put on poetry readings beginning in November and continuing through June 2008. The grant, which was awarded by the Clackamas County Cultural Coalition and the Oregon Cultural Trust, will fund monthly poetry presentations starting on Wednesday, November 14th. It is Mr. Hogan's intention to provide a forum for local and regional poets.

“Mini-Migration” Successful

Many of our library patrons noticed that they were unable to pay fines, place holds and get new cards on September 17th and 18th. The library staff even went so far as to ask our customers not to return materials on those two days as well. The reason for this inconvenience was that the main computer at the Library Network office in Oak Grove was being replaced. The replacement of this computer was overdue – in fact the computer was so old that it was no longer under warranty and was not covered under a service agreement by its manufacturer. Library Circulation Supervisor Nancy Wittig emphasized the importance of this project: “If that old computer had stopped working, it would have been a disaster. The two –day mini migration was a nuisance to be sure – but now I can sleep at night knowing that we are being supported by up-to-date equipment.” When the patron access terminals came up on Thursday, however, it became apparent that the custom programming to make the “card catalog” information intelligible was lost during the migration. This development was completely unexpected and is in the process of being fixed. Special thanks should go to the city of Milwaukie’s Computer Department and the Library Network office. Working together, this team made it possible for patrons to check out materials while the computers were out of commission.

Please Welcome Safa, Fida, Yesenia and Rebecca

During the past year, the Ledding Library has been fortunate to hire four new employees. Safa Ghnaim was the first of the group to join the Library’s staff. Safa, a student at Portland State University, volunteered at Ledding in the Children’s Library for several years before becoming a paid employee. Fida Ghnaim, hired at the beginning of 2007, also had been a loyal library volunteer. Fida stays busy by working at another job and plans to finish college in the near future. Earlier this summer, Rebecca Robinowitz and Yesenia Villeda became the Library’s newest employees, both starting work here this past summer. Rebecca has worked at the Estacada Public Library for several years and is a student at Portland State University. She plans to pursue a career in library science. Yesenia is in her final year at Milwaukie High School. She would like to attend Clackamas Community College next year and will concentrate in health-related coursework. Yesenia’s ultimate goal is to train for a career in obstetrics.

August 2007 Traffic Report

During the month of August the department responded to 2 injury and 4 non-injury traffic accidents. Milwaukie Police Officers arrested 5 DUII drivers and wrote 481 traffic citations. Of the 407 citations written, 207 were speed related.

During the month of August The Milwaukie Police Department participated in several M.A.T.T. Details. The details were held in Clackamas County, Canby, Lake Oswego, West Linn, Molalla, and Milwaukie. The Milwaukie detail was held on 08/20/07 during the hours of 11 am to 4 pm. The Milwaukie detail statistics are not available at this time.

In August officers issued speed related citations at the following listed locations.

SE River Rd. & Wren - the posted speed limit is 25mph at this location. 14 citations were written for vehicles traveling at 35mph to 39mph, 12 citations were written for vehicles traveling at 40mph to 44mph, and 3 citations were written for vehicles traveling at 45mph to 49mph.

Harrison Street - the posted speed limit is 30mph at this location. 2 citations were written for vehicles traveling at 40mph to 44mph, 6 citations were written for vehicles traveling at 45mph to 49mph, 2 citations were written for vehicles traveling at 50mph to 54mph, and 1 citation was written for a vehicle traveling at 55mph to 59mph.

Milport - the posted speed limit is 45mph at this location. 1 citation was written for a vehicle traveling at 55mph to 59mph, 30 citations were written for vehicles traveling at 60mph to 64mph, 2 citations were written for vehicles traveling at 65mph to 69mph, and 2 citations were written for vehicles traveling at 70mph to 74mph.

Moore's - the posted speed limit is 45mph at this location. 3 citations were written for vehicles traveling at 60mph to 64mph.

Washington - the posted speed limit is 30mph at this location. 13 citations were written for vehicles traveling at 45mph to 49mph, 6 citations were written for vehicles traveling at 50mph to 54mph, and 1 citation was written for a vehicle traveling at 55mph to 59mph.

In the above listed areas 33 citations were written for 10mph to 14mph, 118 citations were written for 15mph to 19mph, 21 citations were written for 20mph to 24mph, 6 citations were written for 25mph to 29mph, and 1 citation was written for 30mph to 34mph, over the posted speed limits.

The traffic unit is currently in the process of adding 1 full time traffic officer. This will bring the traffic unit up to 3 full time traffic officers. Looking to the future the traffic unit is hoping to add a part time traffic officer and a photo radar unit by the first of the year.
